

Obtaining a road race competition license for first time applicants

As part of the ACU's ongoing policy of rider development and education, and in line with requirements as laid down in the ACU Handbook, ALL first time applicants for Novice and Restricted Novice Road Race licences must undergo a training course. The ACU Training Course (ACU-T Course) is designed specifically for you as a first time Road Race Licence applicant. The purpose of the course is to ensure that you understand the basic safety and organisational requirements to participate in road racing. Before any new licence can be issued, you must satisfactorily attend the course and pass the simple multiple-choice test.

The ACU Pre training course is booked by contacting Andreas Racing Association Ltd Race School, Gary Radcliffe, The Lillies, Croit-e-Quill Road, Lonan IM4 7JD Telephone 498104 after 6pm or email garyradcliffer6@hotmail.com.

Once you have booked you'll be sent a letter confirming your place, details of venue date and time, plus a set of course notes.

These are the basic steps that you'll need to follow to obtain a competition licence

- Apply to the Andreas Racing School for Pre T Course (Fee £50)

Then

- Become a member ACU affiliated Club
 - Obtain Licence application form (ACU) then get it signed by an official of your affiliated club
 - You must meet the Eyesight qualifications detailed on application form.
 - You must meet the medical requirements detailed on the form
 - You must satisfy the ACU that you are Competent to ride a motorcycle which can be done in a number of ways
1. Obtain a certificate of competence from a recognised track based training school (ARA for on Island)
 2. Hold a valid Class A driving licence or valid CBT Certificate.
 3. Held an ACU competition licence for a minimum of two years for any off road discipline a copy along with a result sheet from a race, should accompany your application.

Please bear in mind that the course and the test are simple. Our aim is for you to pass the test and enjoy years of safe motorcycle sport. But we also want to ensure that you have an up-to-date knowledge of the rules and safety issues central to your chosen sport.
